Agricultural Department. SEASONABLE HINTS.

Strawberries may be planted towards the en lor this month, or as soon as young rooted ranners can be secured. When plante I at this season they will form fine plants before winter, and produce a fair orop next summer. That truly valuable variety, the Albany seedling, among its other superior qualities, comes sooner into a profitable fruiting condition than any other. No resoners should be allowed to extend from the young plants, and the soil kept perfectly clean and mellow. Many plantations become choked by allowing perpetual weeds to gain even a slight footing in the fall, and when spring arrives they cannot be removed without seriously disturbing the plantation.

Raspberry and Blackberry plants may have their fruiting period extended by giving a heavy mulch of manure between the rows. So called monthly fruiting varicties of the Ruspberry especially will require all the care that can be given to quable them to keep a continu mee of fruit, and even then they will not always meet expectation. Any variety of the rasp ber, y will give a continuance of fruit by outting the canes at certain seasons. As soon as the fruit is gathered, cut out the canes or shoots that produced it, and thin out all the young to three or four, that they may receive every facility to form

well ripened wood.

The Blackberry will require similar treatment as regards thinning. One or two stems, however, are sufficient to retain. Tie up neatly to a cedar pole, and keep all suckers down, and the soil cultivated and clean 'Do not enrich tou heavily, as it has been observed that the the strongest growth are not uniformly productive. The Dorchester is earlier and sweeter than Lawton, although not no large.

In another column we have offered some rentarks on summer pruning trees The same principle may be carried into the vegetable garden, and with more immediate beneficial results, perhaps than in the fruit garden. When the tops or growing points of such plants as toma toos, paus, beans, &o, are removed, the crops will develop and ripen much earlier. Potatoes have been found to ripen earlier and produce a heavier crop when two or three inches of the points were re-moved in August. We know cultivators who invariably practice this topping of their pothto crops, and with good results Melons can be matured a week or two in advance, by stopping and pinching the vines, as practised with grapes. Cucumbers are hastened in a similar manner .-Farmer and Gurdener.

Salads and Summer Sours.

Physiological research establishes the fact that ac ds promote the separation of the bile from the blood, which is then passed from the system, thus preventing fevers, the prevailing diseases of the summer. All fevers are " billious;" that is, the bile is in the blood. Whatever is antagonistic of fever is cooling. It is a mmon saying that fruits are 'cooling, and also berries of every description; it is because the acidity which they contain aids in separating the bile from the blood Hence the great yearning for greens and lettuce, and salads, in the early spring. these being eaten; with vinegar; hence, also, the taste for something sour, for lem onades on an attack of fever

But, this being the case, it is easy to see that we nullify the good effects of berries in proportion as we eat them with sugar, or even with sweet milk or cream. If we cat them in their natural state, fresh, ripe, perfect, it is almost impossible to eat too many, or to eat enough to hurt us, es, pecially if we eat them alone, and not taking any liquid with them whatever. Hence, also, is huttermilk, or even common milk, promotive of health in summe time. Sweet milk tends to biliousness in sedentary people, sour milk is untagonist io. The Greeks and Turks are passion ately foud of milk. The Shepherds use rennet, and the milk dealers alum, to make it sour the sooner. Buttermilk acts like watermelons on the system -Hall's Journal of heal h.

A CURCULIO REMEDY .- P. H. Perry, of Collins Centre, New York, writes as follows:

"A gentleman lately informed me that he has raised a good crop of plums, sim-ply by spreading a heavy cout of fresh horse manure on the ground under his trees. He said it entirely prevented the ravages of the curculio, when on their account he had not been able to gather a crop of plums years before.

A CATERPILLAR FOR A PET .- If any of our readers who have now an utter a version to every species of worm, will, during this month, find one of the larges specimens, such as they would term the ugliest, put him in a secure place, supply him daily with such leaves as he likes, and minutely observe his change as they occur, they will soon become interested and derive pleasure from what was dis gusting before. A paste-board box, con taining a little earth, with a gauze cover to admit air, will answer every purpose In this, the pet caterpillar will cast his skin, weave his winding sheet, change to a winged insect, and come out in a beautiful dress, and thus reward you for your trouble.—American Agriculturist.

BUGS AND CUCUMBERS .- Mr. Bergen, of Long Island, recently stated that some faamers in his neighboohood plant as much as ten acres each of cucumbers, and that the way they save them from bugs, is to use plenty of seed at first, and then at four or five successive pariods they plant on a new side of the hill, a lot more of seed. This supplies an abundance of young plants for the bugs to feed on, and they leave the stronger growing plants untouched. When well out of the way of bugs, the surplus plants are dug up with the hoe .- Homestead.

FARMERS SHOULD PRODUCE THEIR OWN FERTILIZERS - B. F. B., of Pugh. town, Pa, says: "Every farm, however small, can with the aid of lime and plast er, and proper care and management, pro duce manure enough to keep up its fertility and improve its soil. By careful farming, many of the old worn out farms in Eastern Pennsylvania have been restored to productiveness, without the aid of the numerous patent fertilizers, which when tried, have proved a failure. Bone are often ground and used in a raw state particularly to grapes, with advantage. -Genesev Farmer.
