ORDINANCE. RELATING TO CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

1. Be in enacted and ordained by the Town Council of the borough of Carlisle; and it is horough of the content of the same; That it shall be the duty of the bead of tach family, wherein any member is sick of a contagi us disease, to report the fact personally or through the attending physician, to the Chief Burgass, as soon as the same shall come to his or her knowledge, under a penalty of Five Dollars, for any such neglect.

2. That the Chief Burgess shall give immediate no tice to the teachers of the common schools, of the name and residence of the family in which such contagious disease exists; and that during its prevalence in said family, neither the children nor any member thereof, shall be permitted to attend the public schools, under a penalty of Five Dollars, for any such offense, to be collected off the parent, guardian or other person, all lowing such child to be sent to school.

3. That all persons having such disease shall be pro-

3. That all persons having such disease shall be pro-hibited from coming upon the public streets and al-leys of the borough unfil they have entirely recovered, under a penalty of Five Donaas. Provided, however, that if they produce the certificate of a physician, that they are free from contaminating others, the above penalty shall not be imposed.

4. That parents, guardians and all other persons in whose families the disease is known or reported as aforesaid to axist, shall be notified immediately by the chief Burgess, of the prohibition in the preceding sec-tions. 5. That all notices required of the chief Burgess by this ordinance, shall be in writing, and be served by the high constable Enarted Into an ordinance this 28th day of March,
