"If any person not by law qualified, shall fraudulently vote at any election of this Commonwealth, or being otherwise qualified shall vote out of his proper district, or if any person knowing the want of such qualified stans, shall aid or procure such person to vote, the person offending, shall, on conviction be fined in any sum hot exceeding two hundred dollars, and be imprisoned to any term not exceeding three months.

"If any person shall vote at more than once election district, or otherwise fraudulently vote more than once on the same day, or shall fraudulently fold and deliver to the inspector two tickefs together, with the intent illegally to vote, or shall practure, another to do so, he or they offending, shall on conviction be fined in any sum not less than three nor more than twelve months.

"If any person not qualified to vote in this Commonwealth agreed by to law, except the sons of qualified citizens, shall appear at any place of election for the purpose of industrictin forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars for every such offenge, and be imprisoned for any term not exceeding three months.

Agreeably to the prayisions of the sixty-first section of the said act, every Gonoral and Special Election shall be opened between the hours of eight and-ten in the forencen, and shall centinue willhout interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when the pulls shall be closed.

And the judges of the respective districts aforesaid are by the said act required to meet at the Court House in the borough of Carlisie, on the hird day after the election, being Friday, the 11th day of October, I then and there to perform the things required of them by law. The return Judges of the Representative district, will meet at Carlisle, at the time fixed by law.


