THE REVENUE FROM THE INTERNAL Tax .- It is too early yet to form an accurate estimate of the probable revenue of the govi ernment from internal taxes. But it is already evident that the framers of the Tax Law, in judging that the annual receipts under it would not be more than \$150,000,000. went far below the truth. All the indications which reach the Commissioner of Internal Revenue-all the data received at his office-go to show that the total annual amount will be nearer \$250,000,000 than \$150,000,000. In one district in New York, where the Collector thought 3,000 licenses would be necessary, 15,000 are required.

THE GRAND JURY of Lehigh county, in a recent report to the Court, recommend that the County Commissioners make provision for the support of families of drafted men in destitute circumstances, the same as those of volunteers. INTERNAL REVENUE DECISION.—The following decision has been made by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue with re- RED gard to harness and upper leather? 1st. The tax on harness leather is seven mills per pound, and is to be paid but once, whether the leather is tanned and finished by the same parties, in the same place, or by different parties in different places. 2d. Finished or curried upper leather, except calf skins made from rough leather, hemlock tanned, or from rough leather, tanned in whole or in part with oak, on which rough leather the tax of seven mills, or one per cent per pound, as the case may be, has already been paid, and is not subject to an additional tax in consequence of such finishing or currying, wherever the latter may be done.

IMPORTANT TO SCHOOL TEACHERS .-We notice by the November issue of the £c iool Journal, that Superintendent Thomas H. Bunnows, has taken an important and highly justifiable step in regard to the rights of School Teachers.
