office in quantities to suit purchasers. Or-ders/should contain remittance of treasury notes, or an original certificate of a United.

States treasurer, or designated depository, of a deposit made for the purchase of stamps. The following commission, payable in stamps, may be allowed :...

One purchase of \$50 or more, 2 per cent. One purchase of \$100 or more, 3 per cent. One purcaase of \$500 or more, 4 per cent.

One purchase of \$1,000 or more, 5 per cent. As each stamp expresses upon its face its kind as well as its denomination, it is desira-

ble that every order should refer to kinds as well as denominations. By the third section of the act passed December 25, 1862, every instrument is valid. provided a legal stamps

or stamps, denoting a duty of the amount required shall have been duly affixed and used thereon. Broprietary stamps, cannot be used upon any instrument specified in schedule B.

Stamps of every kind and denomination can be furnished in sufficient quantities for use in-the District of Columbia and the States west of the Rocky mountains.

Collectors are hereby required and directel to commence proceedings under the law gainst all persons with said District and States who shall wilfully neglect to use stamps

## WHAT IS PAR?

The measure by which we determine wheth The measure by which we determine wheth-er any currency is depreciated or apprecia-ted, or that which everybody should have in their minds when they spack of par, is the Mint price of the standard of the currency. Say the standard is gold, then par is the Mint price of gold. In the United States the Mint price of gold. In the United States the Mint price of gold. In the United States the Mint price of fine gold is \$20.71. per ounce, that is, an ounce of gold will make \$20 in coins and leave 71 cents over. Now, when gold is above or below this price in the margold is above or below this price in the mar-ket, it is above or below par; at present gold may be said to be worth in the market \$26 per ounce, therefore, gold is about 30 per cent above par. Let us continue to recollect, cent. above par. Let us continue to recollect, therefore, that par is \$20.71 for an ounce of fine gold, \$1.00 for 23.2 grains. Now what is the connection of paper currency with this state of things? Paper currency is a substi-tute for gold at its par, or Mint price. The question; therefore, whether paper currency is depreciated, depends upon this, whether it is of equal value to exchange for commodilies as gold at its Mint price. If it is not, it is below par, but if it is, it has not depreciated. This point is readily determined by the mar-ket or, exchange value of gold ; when the market and the Mint prices of gold coincide, no more can be purchased with a gold dollar than with a bank note in good credit, or a government note for one dollar; but if the market price of gold goes above its Mint

market price of gold goes above its Mint price, while the same quantity of anything except gold can be nurchased with the paper
