The undersigned committee appointed by the Court to visit and examine into the condition and mode of management of the Poor House of this county, respect-

management of the Poor House of this county, respectfully report:

That in the discharge of the duties assigned us, we have frequently visited said institution during the past year. At each vi-it we made a through examination of the different apartingants and are gratified to be able to state, that under the systematic mode of management adopted by the present Steward, good order, cleantiness, and contort are observable in all of them, with the exception hereinafter noticed. The well white-washed walt, clean scrubbed floor, the neatly arranged and tidy appearance of the beds and bedding. The absence of vermin, the generally cheerful and contented countenances of the immates, with their expressions of grateful acknowledgement of kindness reding. The absence of vermin, the generally cheerful and contented controvences of the immate, with their expressions of grateful acknowledgement of kindness receivel, satisfy us, that poverly, fifth and diegraritien are not necessary cone mirants of this institution, but by judiction, management, it may be rendered a comfort the home for the recipients of its charity.

The inmates are supplied with good and, wholesome food, and comfortable clothing, those who are fitted for it, are required to labor and their physical and montal health is thereby invigorated; the sick have confortable and commodious rooms, are waited on by caroful nurses, and receive the attention of a judicious physician. The register presents the following:—the number in the house on January 1st 1862, was 141, of whom 19 were colored, admitted since, 239; births, 8; making the number provided for during the year, 38; of these 21 have died, of whom 5 were colored, 2 have been bound out and 212 discharged leaving in the house 153 of, 46 no. 31 are colored. The out-food paupers are 67, making the whole number charged be on January 1st 1842, 920. In addition to the above, the large number of 2801 transient or traveling purpers have been received into the institution and provided for short positions.

ceived into the institution and provided for short periods. We are also much pleased with a well conducted school of 22 pupils, from 5 to 14 years, taught by a member of the Steward's family. Also, your committee have conferred with the present Board of Directors, as to an improvement in the premises occupied at present by the insane attached to the institution.—Much might be done to alleviate their unhappy condition, in creeting larger sized and better ventilated apartments for their occupancy. But the necessary increasing expenditures of the coming year have, as yet, left the Board undetermined as to the criping out of their contemplated improvements, for the benefit of this pittable portion of their charge.
