The second class will therefore be composed entirely of married men between thirty-five and forty-five years, and they cannot be called into service until the whole of the first class has been exhausted.

The persons enrolled shall be subject to duty for two years after enrollment, and may be called into service for 3 years or the war. The greatest difficulty in executing the laws heretofore providing for an enrollment of the militia has been in mustering the men, bring ing up delinquents, and arresting deserters obviate these defects and provide for a faithful execution of the law, provision is ! made for provost marshalship in every State and Congressional district, with a central office and officer at Washington. These provost marshals are to arrest spies and desert ers from the army, either regulars, volunteers, or militiamen, to restrain treasonable practices, and execute the regulations for the

enrollment of the militia. Whenever a draft is to be made, the operation is to be conducted by a board of enrollment. The President is to assign to each district its quota of mili iamen, allowing for volunteers and men in service. The citizens who are drafted have ten days to procure a substitute, or they may insure an immunity from service by the payment of \$300 for the procurement of a substitute, or such smaller sum as the Secretary of war shall determine. Under the militia laws of this State the whole population hable to military duty was required to present itself to the Draft Commissioners before it was known which of their would be hable to the draft. This cart before-the horse methol of doing business is not to be followed under the proposed Act. -There can be no opportunity for an enrolle! person to present his excises for exemption until the lot has fallen upon him. He then is to present himself to a Board of enrollment for his district, consisting of the Provost Marshal, a surgeon and one other person. This Board has the power to discharge him if physically or mentally unfit, or it he has any of the causes for exemption named in the Act.

These are the principal provisions in the proposed bill which relate to the militir. It is much better than any Act regulating the militia yet passed, and although there must always be hardships in the operations of a law which compels citizens to do military du ty, those hardships are avoided in a great de gree by the provisions of the proposed hill.
