er purely in self-defence. When the Commonwealth had closed, it had succeeded in making out so strong a case against one of the defendants, (MARSHALL) that the other (FOULK) was by the direction of the court, acquitted. No less than three wit nesses swore positively that MARSHALL WAS the man who shot Barney. At this juncture FOULK comes upon the stand, and establishes the unlooked for state of facts detailed above. The result, when the strong corroborative evidence which was adduced had been heard, was no longer doubtful. The statement of Sheriff Rippey that Foulk's face at the time of his reception into the jail, bore the mark of a sabre cut-the scar being still visible, taken with the fact that Barney was not struck until he had followed Foulk almost to the spring, go far to establish the truth of Foulk's statement.

The case on both sides was managed with signal ability, the defence exhibiting that peculiarly skillfull handling, which the cial attention nicety of the points involved required.

Death of a Carlisle Soldier.

There is always a melancholy pleasure in chronicling the record of a brave man. Such a one we propose to notice in this instance.-FREDERICH SANNO, a name as familiar in our mouths as household words," is the subject of this brief sketch. Born in the year 1806, his early boyhood was passed amidst the stirring scenes of the war of 1812, and being the son of that veteran soldier Major M. Sanno. who served his country with honor in that eventful contest, it is not strange that he inherited a love for fame and that his young heart yearned for military distinction and renown. Other pursuits occupied his attention, however, until the year 1840, when he enlisted in the 5th U.S. Infantry, in which regiment he served five years in Florida and five years in Mexico, participating in a number of those glorious engagements which have rendered American arms and valor so conspicuous the world's history. At the conclusion of his term of service he returned to his home in this place, where he remained until the breaking out of the present unhappy intestine struggle. At the first call to arms he responded with his characteristic, alacrity was appointed a Corporal in Captain Fuller, s company of the 55th, Pennsylvania regiment of Infantry. He accompanied his regiment in the celebrated Hilton Head ex pedition, performing his duties nobly until stricken down with the malarious feverthat scourge of the Southern climate, which has proved so fatal to our brave soldiers in that region. Notwithstanding every effort in 1 his behalf, the insidious malady with which he : was prostrated continued to increase in virulence until the gallant soldier who never hesitated to meet death on the battle field, was compelled to succumb, and on the 6th of March last he yielded up his life to the fell destroyer; dying in a distint land, far from his home and triends; and unding a grave on those shores where the roar of the mighty waters will be his only requiem until the last day.
