The death of "Stonewall" Jackson is announced in late Richmond papers. During the battle of Chancellorsville he was wounded in the left arm. Amputation was performed, the limb being taken off above the elbow, with a view to save his life. The result proves that the operation was in vain, and the celebrated Chieftain, the pride and boast of the Rebel army, "sleeps his last sleep."

REMEDY FOR FLIES.—By scattering chloride of lime on a plank in stable, all kinds of flies, but more especially biting flies, may be quickly got rid of. Sprinkling beds of vegetables with even a weak solution of this salt effectually preserves them from the attacks of slugs, caterpillars, butterflies, moths, etc. It has the same effect when sprinkled on the foliage of fruit trees. A paste of one part of chloride and one part of lard, placed in a narrow band round the trunk of a tree prevents insects from creeping up it. It has been noticed that rats and mice quit places on which a certain quantity of chloride has been spread.
