The gunbeat Pawnee, which supported the left flank, grounded, and a rebel battery opened upon her, firing about lifty shots, thirty-nine of which hit her. She subsequently floated off and opened upon the rebels, putting them to flight. Our casualties were small, and the rebels

were taught a lesson which they will not soon forget.
The bombardment of Fort Wagner was re newed on the morning of the 22d, the iron-

clads co operating with the army. During the day Fort Wagner was silenced for some time and her colors shot away. The new Union batteries were opened upon the rebels, doing great execution. LATER.

A charge was made upon Fort Wagner, and our troops, after a desperate struggle, were obliged to fall back, which they did in excel lent order, and held their old position.

The loss on our side was quite severe; bu our total loss in killed, wounded and missing since the 10th, has only been about 1,000 The 48th N. Y. Regiment lost about 450 men, and only three of its officers escaped unharmed.

> SHOOTING AFFRAY-DEATH OF ONE OF THE PROVOST GUARD .- On Tuesday afternoon last a most unfortunate affair occurred, which resulted in the death of Samuel C Jorden, a member of Captain Clegg's company, of the 31st Reg. P. M., now acting as Provost Guard in Carlisle. The particulars of this terrible tragedy are mainly as follows. The guard acting under direction of Provost Marshal Henderson, has collected a number of straggling and stolen government horses; hese horses were put in & field at the west side of town, where a guard was stationed. On Tuesday the sentinel on duty at this post was private Stephen H Fisher, of Philadelphia. Fisher, is a man over sixty years of age, and has served several enlistments in the regular army. About two o'clock in the afternoon, Jorden-who for some insuborlinate conduct- had been reduced from his position as sergeant, to the ranks, and was then under arrest—walked out to the field where the horses were kept, and insisted upon taking one of them telling the sentinel that he was his superior in rank and intended taking a ride upon one of the horses. Ste phens informed him that his orders were to permit no person to take a horse without ar order from the commanding officer. Jorden persisted in his purpose, and mounted a horse. The old man told him to get off, or he would certainly shoot him. Jorden lau ched at the threat and endeavered to force the horse by the old man, when the latter raised his piece, and fired, the ball entering the left shoulder, passed entirely through the body and came out on the right side. He was carried to the college hospital, where it was ascertained that he was fatally injuredthe spinal column having been fractured. He lived about half an hour, during which time he acknowledged his fault, and entirely exsulpated Fisher from any guilt in being the cause of his untimely death. Deceased is a yoong man a native of New York, but has been following his occupation which the manufacture of machinery for paper mills in Philadelphia. He leaves a wife and two children to mourn his early loss.

There shall to an adminish section to the state of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

Section 4. Whonever any of the qualified electors of this Commonweal h shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight, and nine, as follows:

Section 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills. ills Section 0. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, ha-been, or may hereafter be, conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth.
