That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth in accordance with the pravisions of the tenth article thereof:

There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution of the to-the article of the constitution. four, as follows: Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of

Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonweal h shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercice the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizons, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place obelection. There shall be two additional sections to the claventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight, and nine, as follows:

Section 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, contaming more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills. bills *
Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been, or ray hereafter be, conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth.
