That the following amendments be pronosed to the Consclintion of the Commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of the tenth atticle thereof:

There shill be an additional section to the third and ticle of the Conscitation, to be designated as section four, as follows:

Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonweal bishall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the Pesident of the

Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonweal by shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the Pessident of the Unified States, or by the authorby of these Common wealth, such electrons may every be the electron such that the such readings in all electrons by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or, shall be, prescribed by law, as fally as it they were present at their usual place of election.

There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight, and nine, as follows:

Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature
granting any powers, or privileges, lu any case, where
