

A Joint Resolution Proposing

Strins 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this common weal his all be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election. There shall be two additional sections to the obeyonth article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight, and nine, as follows:

Sectic 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills

of this Commonwealth.
