consul at Leeds and Mr R. M. Stevenson his agent at Sheffield, England, though inoluded in the Treasurer's report, seems to deserve especial mention. We have formally returned our acknowledgemeats to the donore.

The action taken at our last quarterly meet ing for the relief of the families of soldiers resident in our midst, by the appointment of a committee to visit and report on their wants, has led to the disbursement of considerable sums in a way that has commended itself to the judgement of the Board. Pledges, very distinctly made to some of the men still in arms, require redemption ; and we must not shrink from the task of distributing as faith-fully as we may, the funds that may be devoted to that use. The ladies who have acted as visitors certainly deserve our heartlest thanks for the pains and labour expended in this behalf. It may be that they have found Carlisie, need which they could not relieve, or some difficulty in determining the exact measures of help to be bestowed. But we only claim to do the best we can, not at all to be infallible. and we can very cordially endorse the action of our visiting committee. We are happy to know that several plans are projected to add to the funds of the Sociepayers, ty.
