We advised, among other things, against the killing of their calves, and warned them that cattle would soon become scarce if they continued the wanton practice. Few of them, however, heeded our advice, and we are now reaping the fruits of their obstinacy and selfishness. Had they raised their calves they would have been well remunerated for their trouble, and the present scarcity of cattle would not have taken a law making it a crime to kill a calf during the continuance of the war.

But why should everything be up in price? "On account of the war," answers the seller. Fiddlesticks! What has the war to do with hens laying eggs, cows giving milk, or the raising of cabbage? The fact that eggs, milk, cabbage, and a hundred other arcicles consumed by housekeepers are not used in the army, should rather tend to lower these articles instead of putting them up in price. No, it is not on "account of the war" that we are paying such outrageous prices formarketing. It is because these prices are asked and we town people yield to the demand. That is the whole secret. We have never been in the habit of complaining because of high prices, but really it is almost impossible for a man of ordinary business to maintain his family at the present rates of living. It amounts to an imposition and an

Another thing is felt in our market, and this is the want of room. We believe many more farmers would bring their products to market but for this cause. Let our town authorities build another wing to the markethouse and remedy this evil. Considering the population of our town, the present market-house is entirely too small. We hope the Council will look at this evil and apply the remedy .- · Volunteer.

UNITED STATES INTER-NAL REVENUE.

Annual Taxes for 1864.

The attention of tax payers is hereby called to the provisions of the United States Excise Law relative to the assessment of annual taxes.

By the sixth section of the act of July 1, 1862, it is made the inty of all persons, partnerships, firms, associations, or corporations, made liable to any annual duty, license, or tax, UN OR BEFORE THE FIRST MONDAY OF MAY IN EACH YEAR, to make a list or return to the Assistant Assessor of the District where located of the amount of annual locome, the articles or objects charged with a special tax, and the bulsness or occupation liable to pay any license.

Every person who shall fail to make such return by the day specified will be liable to be assessed by the Assessor according to the best information which he can obtain; and in such case the Assessor is required to add fifty per centum to the amount of the licens of

to add fifty per centum to the amount of the items of such list.

Every person who shall deliving to an Assessor any false or fraudulent list or statement, with intent to ende the valuation or enumeration required by law, is subject to a tree of five hundred deliars; and in such cases the list will be made out by the Assessor or As sistant Assessor, and from the valuation and enumeration so made there can be no appeal. Payment of the annual taxes, except those for licen see, will not be demanded until the thirtieth day of June.
