A CRUEL SELL.—A wag in the West says the following is true: Worthy C-is one of the best rep-

The latter looked at the order for a moment, and then exclaimed, "When I came here this morning, Mr. Lincoln, I was fully determined to vote for McClellan if I could get home, but I have now changed my mind and shall vote for you. 
