MRS. ANNIE M. SUTTON, Sec. L. M. So Your letter dated the 13th, stating that you had expressed a barrel to my address, containing Kraut for the returned prisoners, was received to-day. The barrel has not yet been received, but will doubtless appear in due time. I write before its received. acknowledge the kindness and liberality of the Society you represent, because just now I have a few moments lei-ure: a relief I may not have again until after New Year's. I thank the good ladies of the "Mite Society" of Carlisle, in behalf of these suffering, no ble men, so long in bondage, and so long tortured and starved and inhumanly treated by the boasting chivalry of the South, for their donations. May God reward them an hundred fold. Had I time I might write you many interesting particulars about those received at this hospital. About 8,000 have already arrived. More are expected daily. The hospitals are all full. But we must make provisions for are the particular and the statements of the statements of the statements. make provision as far as we can, for all that may yet come. Death is making fearful hav-

may yet come. Death is making fearful havor among those received for medical treatment. They soon sink after getting-home. The system is so reduced and emaciated, that the skill of Surgeons and the kind and constant care of nurses, are not sufficient to build them up. Many only live through the excitement of the trip and the joy of once more getting (as they express it) into "God's "Country." To day we have a funeral of 33, all these released men, who came but a few days ago. On one occasion, about ten days ago, forty two bodies were gathered in front of our chapel for funeral rites, and generally when a burial is to take place, which is now when a burial is to take place, which is now almost every day, we have not less than ten, twelve, fifteen eighteen bodies to bear to the Soldiers' Cemetry.

SATURDAY Evening, 17th. "I was called off and was not permitted to finish my letter yesterday. This was occa-sioned by the arrival of another transport or Steamer with prisoners from Charleston Harbor - about seven hundred men and over fifty officers. Many of them exhibited the same marks of cruel treatment as those re-ceived before. Poor boy's they are greatful for even this privilege, after so long and so barbarous a stay and experience among the slave drivers of the South.
