H. and divided among them. Your committee would express their regret that one of the principal witnesses has declined to testify in the case, thus rendering the testimony somewhat defective, and placing himself in no enviable attidude in relation to this matter. While Mr. Tatlow Jackson, who employed this witness as his attorney, has come forward and, with a candor which does him credit freely gives his testimony, this witness has, as we think, very improperly, sheltered himself under the pretext of professional duty. It is for the Senate to say how far he shall be protected by this ex-

In conclusion, your committee beg leave to report that they have examined all the witnesses in the case that it was in their power to reach, and to recommend that the Speaker issue his warrant for Mr. Albert Schofield, who has evaded the com--mittee by refusing to testify, and that he be brought before the bar of the Senate. to answer such interrogatories, touching the subject of this investigation, as may be propounded to him.
