The result in Cumberland county though not by any means what we desired, is still vory encouraging. We doubt exceedingly whether there is another county in the State similarly situated in which the minor ity party made as gallant a light, or as signally gained ground on the enemy. In es timating the result throughout the State comparisons have been invariably made with the vote for President in 1864, and not with " that of last year. The reason for this is obvious. In 1864 the most important issues were to be decided as well as the highest offices to be filled. The consequence was that both parties exerted themselves to the ut-

most, and the vote of each was, very fully brought out. Last year, no important offlees were to be filled, and no very distinct issues were presented. Both parties relaxed their efforts, and in every county in the State unless some matter of local interest stimulated exertion, there was a falling off in the majority of the dominant party. Philadelphia and Alleghony on our side very fully illustrate this fact. In each of these places our majority was reduced by several thousands, and in many of the Democratic strongholds. there was almost a corresponding falling off. In this county McClellan's majority of 770 was reduced about 350-Davis's being 420. This could be traced directly to the indifferenco manifested by the Democracy in not bringing out their vote. Although they lost considerably we gained none on our former vote-it was even not nearly so large as it had been the previous year, and although all the soldiers were at home and our voting population consequently larger than it had been during the war, still the vote nolled was less than it had been at the two preceding elections. It is obvious therefore that the result of last year's election in this county was no indication of the relative strength of the parties.

Let us now consider the present vote o our County as compared with that of 1864. and also glance at the difficulties under which the party that sustained Congress labored during the canvass.
