I only desire a fair trial and test of any kind to prove the superiority of my shovel in every respect, over the point tooth in

My shovel is set to run a certain depth and until it reaches that depth it is drawn rapidly down into the ground. When however the bottom of the shovel reaches the angle of the line of draught it runs land and to clede or hard spots in the large rocks or stumps it regains its dopth more rapidly than does the point tooth. With respect to its liability to choke, I have found nothing of the kind.
