OPINION OF THE COURT. The defendant Adam Titus was indicted for the murder of Henry Stahm at January Oyer and Terminer and ron the Std. of June 1869 he was brought into Court and being arraigned put in the plea of guilty. The Seventy-fourth Section of the Act of 31 of March 1860 provides: that if any person indicted for murder "Shall be convicted by confession the Court shall proceed by examination of witnesses to determine the degree of crime and to serve

termine the degree of crime and to son-tence accordingly."

We have examined the witnesses on part of the Common wealth and the defen-dant, and the law has assigned to the Court, in this case the grave and responsi-ble duty of determining whether the de-fendant is guilty of murder of the first or

second degree.

The wincesses examined disclose the following state of facts. The defendant and deceased had been working on the South Mountain rail road, near Carlisle, they camelto Shippensburg on Monday evening the 28th of December 1868, Titus bought pair of shoes and borrowed the money om Stahm to pay for them. They then erf out to Mrs. Fry's, the mother-in-law of Titus, a few miles from Shipp nsburg and near the South Mountain, with whom Titus and his wife resided. Stahm remained Monday night at Mrs. Fry's and on Tuesday morning Titus again borrowed money from Stahm, the amount Mrs. Fry could not state, but she saw Stahm hand Titus a note. Titus then went to Shipponsburg and returned with two small sacks of floursome coffee, a looking glass and a coal oil lamp. The next morning (Wednesday the 30th) Titus asked Mrs. Fry, if she knew where they could get any meat.

Mrs. Fry said she thought they could get meat at Mr. Smith's Mrs. Fry then went to Mr. Smith and on her return told Titus they could get meat from Mr. Smith. Titus said Stahm had no small change, but they would go to town and determined be the money changed. Stahm then said he would have to save his money that he might take sick or not be able to get work. About three o'clock in the afternoon Titus sa'd they were going to chop wood: they took the axe and left the house together. Titus returned slone about five o'clock (Wednesday.) He said he had left Stahm in the woods. The next morning (Thursday 31st Dec.) he inquired for the shovel and put it in the hop pen; went to Mr. Smith's and paid \$6.60 for meat and butter and brought it home, and in the afternoon he and his wife went to Shippens-burg and bought clothing and other arti-cles to the amount of \$28 which Titus paid for. The next morning he got up early and after breakfast, said he was going to Martin Mooney's. Mrs. Fry observed that morning that the shovel was gone. Mrs. Worley proves that on Thursday Titus borrowed from her a mattock which he returned on Friday. The returned on Friday. This theory is not sustained by the evidence, and is directly contradicted The murder was perpetrated certainly on Wednesday. On the afternoon of Wednesday the prisoner and deceased went to the woods. and the prisoner returned alone about five o'clock P. M.

After supper he said he was going to stony point to get some money changed, and returned about eight o'clock with some candy—on Thursday morning he went to Smith's and paid him \$6,50 for meat and butter, and returned with it. In the afternoon Titus and his wife went to Shippens noon. Titus and his wife went to Shippens-burg and bought and pad for the articles-enumerated, anounting to \$28. This evidence shows conclusively that the grave was dug and the body buried on Friday—and other evidence proves as conclusively that the prisoner expended at Smiths' and in Shippensburg, on Thursday, between thirty and forty dollars. This money must therefore have been taken from Stahm on the day he was murdered, for it was expended by defendant the day before he buffed the body. "The prisoner's counsel further allege that the murder may have been committed in a quarrel, after blows bad been interchanged by the parties. The facts in evidence in this case point unerringly to the degree of crime of which the defendant is guilty beyond all room for doubt—The prisoner took the deceased to his house—twice he obtained money from his bouse—twice he obtained money from him to supply the wants of his family and being regreed the third time, then within an hour or two, u: ler the pretext of cutting wood, he takes the deceased to a low secluded spot, obscured from view by the surrounding hills, and by the margin of a pond, a fit place to conceal the deal body, he cruelly murders him by repeated blows almost severing the head from the body, and then robs the deal body of his friend, and guest, of a sum not less than \$80 or \$40. To arrive at any other result than that the evidence proves a willful, deliberate and premeditated killing would be a perversion of law and an evasion of justice.
