OBITUARY.

Joseph Ritner, the venerable ex-Gover-

Joseph Ritner, the venerable ex-Gover-nor of this Commonwealth, and for more than 30 years a resident of this county, died, on Saturday last, at the residence of his-son, in South Middleton township. He was born in Berks coun-ty, on the twenty-fifth day of March, 1780, and was therefore in his ninetieth year when he died. Although Governor Ritner has been in retirement for mo e than the average life of a generation of than the average life of a generation of men, and has theyefore been almost for-gotten by those who are now busy in the political world, he at one time wielded apotent influence in this Commonwealth which was due as much to his earnest-ness and solidity of character, as to the high political stations which he filled. ' When a mere lad he removed, to this county, where he hired himself to a fariner, and worked steadily at that occupa-tion until he arrived at the sage of 20, when he married. Some time after his marriage he removed to Westmorelan county, and finally settled in Washington county. When nearly 40 years old he was elected by the Democratic party to-House, and won for himself an excellent reputation as a presiding officer, on ar-count of his promotness, impartiality, and knowledge of the rules. After his service in the House, he was a candidate street, a short distance below the corner for Senator, but was defeated.
