At the branch mint, Denver, Colors lo, the deposits for unparted bars, were gold, \$795,866.38; silver, 54,828.63; total deposits, \$850,395.01. The deposit at this branch for the fiscal year ending June 80, 1868, were, \$363, 017,78, show ing an increase of \$487,377.23.

Prior to and since the recent act of Congress changing this branch from a mint to an assay office, it has been en gaged in melting, assaying, and stamping gold and silver bullion, returning the same to the depositors in the form of unparted bars, bearing the Government stamp of weight and fineness. As an as say office it will meet all the demands of the miner, and promote as effectually the mining interests of the region as a mint for coinage could possibly do.

At the Branch Mint, Charlotte, North Carelina, the deposits have been very limited, but are increasing. It is now in operation as an assay office, deposits being received assayed, and returned to depositors in the form of unparted bars. The deposits for unparted bars were, gold, \$3,160,40.

The branch mints at Dahlonega, Georgia, and at New Orleans, Lonisiana, have not been in operation. No neccessity now exists for their continuance, either as assay offices or branch mints.

POSTMASTER GENERAL'S RE

PORT. As many of our readers may not have the inclination or leisure to read the whole of the report of Postmaster General Creswell, and as almost every one is in erested in postal affairs, a brief extract nay be acceptable. The report is able, s concise as possible, and exhibits the ffairs of the department in a favorable light. There has been, under Mr. Cresvell's management, improvement in both ncome and expenditures. The revenues were \$18,844,510,72, and the expenditures \$22,780,592,65, an increase of the former ver 1868 of 12.59 per cent. The respective revenues and expenses of the fiscal year ending June, 1870, are estimated at \$20,878,691, leaving a deficiency of \$4,-702,182. The sales of postage stamps and stamped envelopes were \$15.078. 061, an increase of \$1,214,907 over the preceding year. The number of mail routes is stated at 8449, making an aggregate of 229,721 miles, and in annual ansportation of mails 70,728,409 miles. at a cost of \$11,681,728. Of these routes 29,587 miles are by rail, and 20,770 by eamboat. The increase over the preeding year has been 6,803 miles, and in annual transportation 6,499,078 miles, at an increased cost of \$140,445. The cost of transit has been 11.41 cents per mile by railroad and 17.88 cents by steamer.

There are in the United States 27,106 ostmasters, an increase during the past year of 625. Of these \$80 are appointed by the President and Senate, and the reainder by the Postmaster General. During the past year there were received at the Dead Letter Office 8,052,862 fetters. The money order system has been a gratifying success. The business has grown from \$1,860,122 in 1865, to \$24,-848,058 in 1869, and the last year paid a profit to the department of \$65,558. The Report on Foreign Mail Service
