This change of salaries, which occurs every second year, involves an immense amount of labor. the new salaries being based upon sworn statements of each postmaster of the smount received during the six months ending December 31, 1869, on accountof stamps sold, letter postage, and box rents, all of which must be carefully examined. OWNERS OF REAL ESTATE, RE-CORD YOUR DEEDS.

The attention of owners of real es tate, whose deeds are not recorded, is called to the following act of Assembly on the subject.
