SPEECHES IN THE EVENING.

Tuesday morning dawned bright and clear, with scarcely a cloud ruffling the Heavens. According to previous announcement, this day had been set apart by our colored citizens, as a day of general celebration, and religious observance of the ratification of the Fifteenth Amendment. From early morn our streets presented a lively appearance, and the arrangements which had been going on for some days received a hasty completion. Around the Court House were seated groups of Democratic politicians, and the unusual event, and prophesying that not more than one hundred would be in line, and the whole thing prove a failure. In fact, about ten o'clock this seemed probable, as very few colored persons were seen upon the streets, but it was easily explained by the statement that at that time they were gathered in their several places of worship, returning thanks to Almighty God for the blessings and privileges vouchsafed them, and invoking His protection and blessing on their future actions.

At ten o'clock the parade was in full progress, and the streets were thronged with people. The procession was led by the colored citizens, followed by the white citizens, and the whole was a most impressive sight. The parade was a grand success, and the people were highly pleased with the result.

At a speech delivered by Hon. J. M. McKim, on the evening of the fourteenth instant, Senator Reynolds spoke as follows: "I have always been to the Penna. a popular affection. The good Quaker stock of its citizens always extended my admiration. They have always been the champions of equal rights. In the days gone by, when the white man was the only one who had the right to vote, the descendants of Penna. were always ready to aid them when it cost something to extend such a right. A quarter of a century has hardly passed since Dr. McClintock was arraigned at the bar of justice for defending their rights. I have always had a high respect for him; and when the news of his death reached me in Washington, I felt that Abolitionism had lost one of its ablest defenders."
