How to Carve. - Although it is a daily duty for many men and women to cut up meat for a family, there are multitudes who do it neither well nor wise. The following suggestions, from an agricultural paper, on this point, may not be out of place, the more especially to young ousekeepers: To carve fowls, which should always

e laid with the breast uppermost, place the fork in the breast, and take off the vings and legs, without turning the fowl: then cut out the merry thought cut slices from the breast; cut out the collar bone; cut off the side pieces, and then cut the carcass in two. Divide the joints in the leg of a turkey.

In carving a surloin, cut thin slice's from the side next to you (it must be put on the dish with the tenderloin underneath), then turn it. Help the guests to both kinds. In carving a leg of mutton or ham

begin by cutti ngacross the middle to the Cut a tongue across, and not lengthrise, and hold from the middle part. Carve a forequarter of lamb by separaing the should er from the ribs, and then

ivide the ribs. To carve a loin of yeal, begin at the maller end and senarate the ribs. Helr each one to a piece of kidney and its fat, Carve pork and mutton in the same way. To carve a fillet of veal, begin at the top and help to the stuffing with each slice. In a breast of veal, separate the

breast and brisket, and then cut up, asking which part is preferred, In carving a pig, it is customary divide it and take off the head before it comes to the table, as to many persons the head is revolting. Cut off the limbs and divide the ribs.

In carving venison, make a deep incision down the bone to let out the juice, and turn the broad ond toward you, cut ting deep and in thin slices. Warm plates are very necessary with venison andemutton, and in winter are desirable for all meats.
