> RAILROAD ACCIDENT .- Numerous r ports were affoat in our city this morn ing of a terrible accident on the Pennsylnia railroad, and the number of killed and wounded variously estimated. Upon inquiring at headquarters, we were inormed that their information was rather mixed up as yet, but as near as they could-ascertain-the-accident-occurred-as follows: The way passenger train west had reached Leaman Place station, and had nearly come to a stand still, when the Philadelphia express east was thrown from the track (by the crossing switch having been turned wrong by a brakeman of one of the freight trains) and ran into the way train. A brakeman named Thomas Swain, of Philadelphia, was killed, and an engineer, whose name we did not learn, was slightly injured. is intelligence and capital to develop the

enormous wealth hidden in its mountain

slones. The people have heretofore

been content to revel in their agricultural riches, but when they see the beneficial effect of the opening of railroad fa cilities into the South Mountain they commence to feel a first interest in the further development of their region. Besides all these ores already enumerated, I find traces of sulphuret of copper (blue vitriol of commerce), red and yellow othre and chrome ores, alum earth and copperas ores, porcelain earth, clay for stone ware, common pottery, glazed ware and fire bricks; also, epsom salts, shell marl, lime, manganese and valuable marbles. The variegated conglomerate which goes under the name of Poto mac marble, from the fact that some of it on the Potomac has been made use of as an ornamental marble for the columns in the old capital at Washington, confrom this range of strata. The red sandstone belt of Connecticut is only an interrupted prolongation of this very exests-that the Cumberland Valley and tensive red shale and sandstone group Pennsylvania Central are likely to have of strata. Here, as in Connecticut, formidable rivals in the field, to compete these strata are intersected by long ridges of trap, the principal masses the rock in this country; and what is not a little remarkable, nearly all the localities of copper ore within this tract are adjacent to these outbursts of trap rock. What this region needs now is more railroad facilities to bring its min eral wealth into a profitable market. When that is done, capital will flow toward it as naturally as a duck takes to water, and the prices of its land will go up, as sites are needed for manufacture ing establis hments and buildings for the chanical population which will be attracted towards it. P. Wickersham to commission the plaintiff as County Superintendent of Common Schools in Cumberland county. The facts of this case are substanti-

ally as follows: The convention of directors to elect a County Superintendent, met at Carlisle, May 4, 1869, and having duly organized, several ballots took place without an election. Finally all the candidates but two informally withdrew, and the ballot stood 56 for Geo. W. Swartz, 55 for D. E. Kast, and one director, although known to be present, refused to vote. not desiring the election of either of these gentlemen. The President of the convention then declared Mr. Swartz elected, but when objections to his decision were made and the law relating to unuel, which was the heaviest part of the election of County Superintendents was read, he refused to decide the question, stating that matter would be left in the hands of the State-Superintendent and the convention adjourned in considerable confusion. Subsequently a cortificate of election was received at the Saligol Department, signed by the President and Secretaries of the convention in which they certify that George Swartz was declared elected vice voce by a major-

ity of the members voting. Twenty-nine directors then potition the State Superintendent not to commis sion Mr. Swartz, declaring his election illegal and he incompetent for the position. Another protest was afterwards received. A full hearing of the case was afforded to all the parties; when Mr. Wickersham decided that the cortificate was not such an ene as the law requires nor in form as prescribed by the Depart. ment, and that it was not designed to b a) legal , certificate. ... Consequently, he could find no authority to commission Mr. Swartz, and accordingly, viewing the office as vacant, appointed Wm. A Lindsay to fill the vacancy.

The case will come up in the Supre Court to-morrow, when David Fleming burg to esq., of Harrisburg, will appear for the planitiff, and Attorney General F. Car roll Brewster for the State Superintene ent of Common Schools.
