AGRICULTURAL, COLUMN: WHEAT STRAW.

If the straw is bright, free from rust is cut at the proper time, carefully cured and stored, it will make a large quantity of excellent fodder, especially for sheep. Every shock of wheat, as soon as the last sheaf is set up, should be covered with a hay-cap, except in cloudy weather. As the ears of the enew grain are nearly all exposed to the burning sun, hay-caps should be provided to prevent too rapid drying of the grain, as well as to protect it from rain. Besides this, if "it is catching weather" (weather when showers and sunshine follow each other in rapid succession) a farmer who employs, hay-caps, can work at his wheat between showers, keep the grain always dry, and the straw bright. As soon a a heavy shower is passed, let the caps be removed, and let the sheaves be reshocked, which will greatly facilitate th curing of both the grain and the straw A great many farmers lose, in one sea son, more than enough in grain, straw, hay, and ill labor, to pay for all the haycaps they might need for many years.

If the grain is to be thrashed in a few days or weeks after harvest, instead of storing the crop in the barn, then running all the straw out of doors, stack the grain near the barn doors, and run as much of the straw into the barn as can be stored. When straw is stacked, let the base be made narrow, and the top carried up from a stight bilge, slim and tall, rather than so broad and flat that it will retain nearly all the rain that may

Good straw is so valuable for fodder that it will pay well to stack it with un usual care. It is always better to make a long and narrow stack, than a broad circular, or square one. The straw should be run on, or pitched on at one end, rather than on one side, as the stack will settle more uniformly. The summit should be finished with a little long hay, or long straw, with a great many of the straight bunches placed up and down the slope, which an expert stacker will do with great rapidity. Then, after the top is finished and a few small hangers put on, let the sides be raked down carefully, when the straw is wet, so that the surface of the top will be covered with straws and leaves lying up and down the slope. If a stack be topped off in the foregoing manner, it will require a heavy and pro tracted storm to wet more than two or tl ree inches deep. If one has at hand a few hundred feet of sound fence-boards, sizteon feet in length, the top of the stack may be built to slope one way, and the boards laid directly on the surface, with narrow ones over the cracks Scarcely an hundred pounds of stray would be damaged in a large stack, if the top were covered in this manner. New York Observer.

NEW ENGLAND'S GRAIN PRODUCT. Of the six States east of the Hudson Vermont comes nearest to raising its own bread, producing 454,000 bushels of wheat in 1869, or about a bushel and a wheat in 1869, or about a bushel and a peck to each inhabitant. Taking the army ration of 22 ounces of flour per day as a basis for computing the consumpraises bread enough to supply the people of the State 22 of the State 37 days, and that to make up the deficiency they are obliged to urchase 3,836,000 bushels per annum. Maine makes the next best showing in the cultivation of wheat, producing is 1869. 278,000 bushels, sufficient to last eleven days, and purchasing 8,500,000 bushels. New Hampshire, with a decreasing population, was a trifle behind Mai e, producing 193,000 bushels-a litue more than a half bushel to each nec ient makes a much poorer showing than New Hampshire, producing 38,000 bushels-enough to supply the people with 'read for ten days-and purchasing 7.518,000 bushels. Massachusetts, though having a larger area than Connecticut, raised only 34,000 bushels, which, ground to powder, was sufficient to give the inhabitants of the State bread enough for breakfast and dinner, but not enough for supper! The people of this commonwealth purchase 20,300,000 bushels of wheat. Rhode Island raised 784 bushels of heat in 1869, and purchases about 3,000,600 bushels per annum. The six New England States together purchase in round 'numbers from 40 to 50,000,000 bushels of wheat, and quite as much of otl c grains; or, in round numbers, 100,000,000 bushels of grain.—Boston Advertisor. . .
