TREASURY OFFICE, July 3, 1849. Dear Sir:-In reply to your note of the 30th altimo, I herewith send you a list of the Supervisors and Superintendents on the public improvements who have drawn money from the Treasury, and the amount drawn by each since the adjournment of the Legislature. The to. tal amount so drawn is \$305,434 92. from which it is easy to judge whether a sufficient amount has been drawn to pay the laborers on the public improvements or not.


