The Central Railroad.
Friday last was the day appointed for receiving proposals for grading the road from Johnstown to Blairville. We are gratified to learn that this gentleman has been elected to the Legislature from Armstrong county. The contest was a warm one, there being two opposition candidates in the field, yet he was elected by a majority of 131. Mr. Rhey will make an able Representative, and will perform his duties with zeal and fidelity.

In today's paper will find the official returns of this county. We were very careful in making out the table, and therefore think it can be relied on as correct.

Business is again quite lively on our public improvements since the late heavy rains: Transporters are now very busy in passing goods over the lines, and they appear to have more than they can do. By the way, speaking of our public improvements, we may be permitted to remark that the experience of last summer ought to be sufficient to satisfy any candid mind of the necessity and importance of having the Western Reservoir completed as soon as possible. The want of water on the Western Division of the Pennsylvania Canal was such, during the past summer, that little or no business could be transacted for nearly two months, by which the State has lost almost as much in tolls alone as would have completed the Reservoir, without taking into consid-

eration the losses sustained by those engaged on it, who were thrown out of employment.—The Reservoir would have supplied the canal with sufficient water during the dry season, and thus prevented any suspension in the business of transportation. We sincerely hope our next Legislature will see the necessity of making an appropriation for the completion of this Reservoir. It would be much better to retrench in other matters, than to neglect that which the experience of the past season has demonstrated to be of the highest importance to the interests of the State.

PENNSYLVANIA ELECTION.

Below we give the returns of the late election as far as heard from. Although the table is not full, and in many places may not be correct, yet we think it will not vary much from the official vote. We think Gamble's majority will be near fifteen thousand. The democracy of the State have come up to the work nobly, and Pennsylvania is redeemed. We have a majority of one in the Senate, and from fifteen to twenty in the House. What an awful destruction of Coons!

California.

Some kind friend in California has sent us a copy of the "Alta California," published in San Francisco of August the 16th. To judge from the tone of the paper, the advertisements, &c., business was very lively, and the citizens were making rapid progress in the establishment of law and order.

The *Alta California* is a sheet not so large as the *Sentinel*, is published weekly at the rate of twelve dollars per annum. Advertisements of ten lines or less are inserted at the rate of four dollars for the first insertion, and two dollars for every subsequent one. Official notices are six dollars for the first insertion and three dollars for every subsequent one. When would we like to publish a paper on such terms! This is a fair sample, however, of how prices rate in California.

The number of the paper before us, contains the address of Col. John W. Geary, Chief Alcalde to the Ayuntamiento or city council of San Francisco. From the following paragraphs, which we extract from it, it would seem the city is very destitute of the means of protecting property or preserving order.

As your presiding officer I deem it my duty to call your attention to the situation of the city, and to ask your co-operation in making it, in point of order and security what it must shortly be in wealth and importance, the first city and great commercial and monied emporium of the Pacific. To effect this, gentlemen, it will require of you great devotion to your duties, as well as great diligence and a liberal supply of funds for municipal purposes.

At this time we are without a dollar in the public treasury and it is to be feared the city is considerably in debt. You
