Will not Clay, and Corwin, and Douglass, and Benton, and Bell, and a host of other distinguished statesmen, both in and out of Congress, and of both political parties, unite with us in forming such a party? And why should not the West be heard upon a question so vital to her welfare? What would be our condition without the Union? We shall not enlarge upon this branch of the subject. The imagination shrinks back appalled at the mere contemplation of the catastrophe. We invoke our brethren of the press in the West, to speak out boldly on this subject. It is far above any mere party obligations—when the integrity of the nation is threatened, it is time for us to forget our allegiance to party, and to remember only the higher duties which we owe to the country.
