Mexico. Governor LETCHER, United States Minister Plenipotentiary to Mexico, presented his credentials to President HERREIRA on the 7th of February, on which occasion the usual courtesies were interchanged, and the usual complimentary speeches made. The impression seems to prevail throughout Mexico, that SANTA ANNA will return, which we believe he will do at no remote period; that he will hold on a year or two, and then, very probably, go again into exile, as a kind of temporary rustication, to which he is now so accustomed, that he has come to regard it, probably, as a matter of course, and an evil which not being remedied, is therefore endurable. They talk now seriously in Mexico of constructing a railroad, an actual iron railroad, from Vera Cruz to the Capital, first, and to be continued thence to Acapulco, on the Pacific. The whole length of the road would be between four and five hundred miles, and would be a work of great utility, but, under the present state of things in Mexico, political and financial, not now, nor for some time to come, realizable, in our opinion. We think a railroad from the Mississippi to San Francisco, is likely to be sooner constructed than the Vera Cruz and Acapulco road, though possibly it might be completed to the city of Mexico, could the country enjoy a dozen years or so of repose, ridding itself first—a sine qua non—of the revolutionary and revolutionizing military elements, which are its crowning curse. The cholera was committing fearful ravages in various parts of Mexico. It is much more to be dreaded there than in this country, for two reasons—the want of comforts among the people, and, in remote districts, the almost entire absence of skillful physicians.—Wash. Globe.

Disast'ous Flood.—The Cincinnati papers of the 5th, contain particulars of the disasters occasioned by a storm which occurred in that vicinity during the greater part of the two previous days. The Times says: The streets and gutters of the whole city were deluged; indeed the sluiceways would have afforded good canoe navigation for over 12 hours. The Ohio rose five feet in the shortest possible time—never known to rise so fast before—and property that was exposed on the banks was swept off. The two Miamis, Mad River, Scioto and Whitewater River, were all pouring out; and the Big Miami was reported as being much higher than heretofore known. Accounts from all parts says the Times agree in stating that the late storm was of terrific import and that the damage resulting therefrom will be large in the aggregate. The mails have been stopped in all directions, but the stoppage will be temporary, we trust. It is impossible to gather, from the accounts, any just idea of the damage done, but it must be immense.

eloquent Extract. The following is one of many very beautiful passages in the late speech of Gen. Cass, in opposition to the WILMONT Proviso: I am no panegyrist of the South. It needs none. I am a northern man by birth, a western man by the habits and associations of half a century; but I am an American above all. I love the land of my forefathers. I revere the memory of the Pilgrims for all they did and suffered in the great cause of human rights, political and religious. And I am proud of that monument which time and labor have built up to their memory—the institutions of New England—a memorial of departed worth as noble and enduring as the world has ever witnessed, glorious and indestructible. But while I feel thus, I

should despise myself if any narrow prejudices or intemperate passions should blind my eyes to the intelligence and patriotism of other sections of our united country; to their glorious deeds, to their lofty sentiments, to their high names, and to those sacred aspirations, common to them and to us, for the perpetuity and prosperity of this great confederation, which belong to the past, to the present, and to the future; and whose feelings and opinions are brought here and reflected here by a representation in this hall and in the other, which now occupies, and has always occupied as high a position as that held by any other portion of the Union—a representation which does honor to our country in all that gives worth to man, and dignity to human nature.
