

dition come from the United States, their first act would be to arm the negroes, even if they should perish all together. The Creoles, generally, are in favor of annexation, but the old Spaniards would lose their last drop of blood in maintaining their sway over this island, the last remnant of their once great American possessions. It is their California—their Dorado—their every thing—without which they would be nothing. Every two or three years, swarms of office holders arrive here from Spain, and in a few years return in affluence; and about six millions are annually drawn from this island to support the mother country.

If we are to be annexed, it must be peaceably; if by force, England and France, I think, would have to interfere. English capitalists have about thirty millions or more invested in this island, which would be every cent lost in case of civil war.

If annexation could be brought about by acts of the pen, instead of the sword, it would be to us a great blessing. Our boys would then be crowded with vessels, instead of being, as they now are, entirely deserted. Our beautiful island would be crossed in every direction by railroads; towns would spring up where there are now but a few palm leaf huts. The great resources of our splendid plantations would then be fully developed, and our commerce would be increased in a tenfold degree. These are a few of the great blessings, which, we think, would result from annexation. But it must be done by diplomacy. If force be employed, this beautiful island will become another San Domingo.

From the Rio Grande, April 25. A late New Orleans paper has news from the Rio Grande to the 10th inst.

The Sentinel is informed by Messrs. Downey and Pratt, who arrived at Brownsville on the 7th instant, that on Saturday, the 5th, while some three miles ride this side of Reynosa, on the Texas side of the river, they found themselves suddenly surrounded by a party of Indians supposed to number about 25.

Their only means of escape was by charging the enemy, which the luckily effected without much injury to themselves. Mr. Downey feels confident that he killed one of the Indians, as he fired his gun when but a few paces distant, and feels assured that he saw him fall.

Lieut. Valle, commanding at Laredo, pursued the Indians who had murdered the San Antonio mail rider, recovered the mail bag and most of its contents but could not find the Indians.

The Sentinel of the 10th says that 6 or 8 days previous, Napoleon F. Kemp, a man pretty well known in that part of the country, was murdered by a party of Indians on the road from Ringgold Barracks to Laredo.

He was accompanying the train, but at the time of his murder was with a soldier belonging to the escort, a short distance in advance of the train. The soldier was badly wounded.

Emigration to California—Injurious effects upon the West.

We perceive by the western papers, that thousands of men, women and children are making preparations to leave by the first of June by the overland route to California. Almost every village or hamlet will send forth its hundred this Spring.

In New York city, for a few days back parties of five, ten, twenty, &c., bound to California, were arriving by railroad and steamboats, to take passage in the steamships Georgia, Cherokee and Empire city, which will leave that port for Chagres &c.

The Detroit Advertiser says that not less than 6,000 have already made arrangements to leave that State for California, and anticipates much pecuniary inconvenience therefrom to those who remain. Many mortgaged their farms, &c., at a high rate of interest, and besides this taking of the sinews of credit and business they are mostly young and active men, who will be embarrassingly missed from fields and workshops.

The Iowa Reporter says that three thousand emigrants will leave that State for California this season, being three times the number who went last spring. Estimating that each emigrant will take with him means equal to \$350—it appears that the emigration to California, this year, will be a loss to Iowa \$1,050,000.

The St. Louis Republican says that there will probably be an emigration of from fifteen to twenty thousand persons from Missouri for California during the current spring. Estimating the number at 17,500, and each emigrant's outfit to average \$350, Missouri will be drained the current spring of over \$6,000,000.

The Rochester (N. Y.) Advertiser, of Tuesday says: We are informed by a gentleman from Burlington, low, that on the 18th of Mar. a large company of California emigrants passed through that city, consisting of about 3,000 men, from nearly all the western States. Two hundred men—mostly citizens of Burlington joined the company at that place. They go the overland route through Oregon, and expect to reach the "diggins" in about three months. The teams that belong to the party numbered 1,000. The men are mostly middle aged, and many of them have families.

About a year since, quite a company of men left Burlington and vicinity, and went to California in search of the "dust," and this spring all returned in excellent health remunerated for their adventurous enterprise. Their good fortune created among their neighbors and friends quite a "gold fever."
