

The River and Harbor Bill. The New York Day-Book thus "hits" some of the features of the log rolling bill for the improvement of the Rivers and Harbors, which broke down with its own weight and the incongruous nature of its provisions, during the last days of the last Congress.

Over and Harbor Bill.—The bill making appropriations to drain John Smith's swamp, in Joe Snooks's garden, ditch in Peter Ferguson's farm, build a new dam for Widow Scroggin's saw mill, turn the current of Leap Frog creek so as to save Lyman Henderson's hog-yard, put down new pump logs for John Anderson, and build a wind mill for Tom Snyder, was defeated in the Senate by the shrewd tactics of the minority. We hope now that Snooks, Snooks, Ferguson, and other lazy rogues and speculators, will go to work and do themselves what might have been done in half the time, and with half the money, which has been spent in trying to persuade Congress to do it for them.

The Contested Eleventh District.—Danville, April 21.—Considerable excitement prevails here among the Whigs and Democrats, owing to a contest between Hendrick B. Wright, (Dem.) and Henry W. Fuller, (Whig) to the seat in the next Congress from this District which is composed of Luzerne, Montour, Columbia, and Wyoming counties. The Court was organized at 10 o'clock by Judge Jayne, of Wyoming county, presiding. Messrs. Wright and Fuller are both present. Hon. Joseph Casey, of Wyoming county, appeared as counsel for Mr. Fuller, and Hon. John Brisbin, for Mr. Wright. The trial will occupy the attention of the Court the entire week.

The Washington Union.—The veteran Ritchie has retired from the editorial chair of the "Washington Union," and A. J. Donaldson, and Gen. Robert Armstrong have assumed the control. Mr. Ritchie has been for years engaged in fighting the battles of the Democracy, and carries with him into the retirement of private life the sincere respect and esteem of all who knew him. The debut of the new conductors, is at a most critical period in the history of the country, and from their well known patriotism and intelligence much will be expected of them, in allaying the storm of misguided fanaticism that has threatened to sever the kindly relations which have heretofore existed between the different sections of the Union. We want able and fearless men at the head of the Democratic press of the country at this juncture; men who are not to be flattered or bullied, but who will stand up for the Constitution and the laws, no matter at what personal sacrifice. We hail the new proprietors of the "Union" as such, and so bid them God speed on their way.—Evening (Phila.) Argus.

PLANK ROAD. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same That James Murray, Gilbert L. Lloyd, William Palmer, John Brawley, Charles Lutzinger, Rees John Lloyd, William Kittell, J. M. Myers, George Settlement, Daniel T. Jones, Anthony Long, Arthur Hill, James Bark W. H. Gardner, Robert Lytle, William McGarvey, and they are hereby appointed Commissioners, and are to open books, receive subscriptions, and organize a company by the name, style and title of the "Jefferson and Ebersburg Plank Road Company," with power to construct a plank road from Jefferson to Ebersburg, in the county of Cambria, by the nearest and best route or routes, as the stockholders or directors may determine upon, subject to all the provisions and restrictions of an act regulating turnpike and plank road companies, passed the twenty sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and the several supplements thereto.

SECTION 2. That the capital stock of said company shall consist of one thousand two hundred shares, at twenty dollars per share. Provided, That said company may from time to time, by a vote of the stockholders, at a meeting called for that purpose, increase their capital stock, so much as in their opinion may be necessary to complete the road and to carry out the true intent and meaning of this act.

SECTION 3. That if the said company shall not commence the construction of their road within three years after the passage of this act, and complete the same within seven years thereafter, this act shall be null and void, except so far as the same may be necessary to wind up the affairs and pay the debts of the company.
