

unity in Ireland, in opposition to the Government and Protestant establishment.

Switzerland.
Cuba, Sept. 8.—Great alarm was occasioned last night, at half past two o'clock, by the falling of the rocks at Felsberg. Nearly the entire population, roused from their beds by the fearful crash of the rocks almost an hour previous to their fall, had quitted the village, and stood on the plain beyond awaiting the awful catastrophe. The night was tolerably light; suddenly a tremendous crash was succeeded by thick clouds of dust and large masses of rock were precipitated from the heights apparently upon the village beneath.

Austria.
A remarkable document has just been published in Austria, containing a full and circumstantial list of all persons put to death by the Hungarians, during the late war, either by their Courts Martial or other tribunals, in Hungary and Transylvania. It is no doubt intended to injure the Hungarians in the eyes of the world. It did not arrive in London soon enough to increase the indignation against Haynau, as it would probably have done.

Gen. Haynau, after lying at Morley's Tavern twenty-four hours, to recover from his bruises, sailed for Ostend, and his arrival in Germany is already announced.

Naples.
The Prince of Capua is on the road to England, for the purpose, it is said, of asking Lord Palmerston to attempt to effect a reconciliation between himself and his brother the King of Naples. Should any arrangement be come to, the Prince will, it is believed, demand that the legitimacy of his children shall be recognised.

Hon. George Hamilton, British Minister at Florence, died in that city on the 2d inst.

Fourteen young men, principally noblemen, have been confined in the citadel of Ancona, for being engaged in a revolutionary plot, other arrests have also taken place. The Florence paper, Statute, quotes the following, without vouching for its truth: "It is reported that Lord Palmerston had addressed to the Court of the Vatican a most energetic note, in which he cautions it against violent measures towards Sardinia."

The Board of Health of Venice, by the decree of the 2d, orders that all merchantmen coming from a port in which the cholera prevails shall be subjected to five days' quarantine and stationary observation.

The Statute, of Florence, of the 3d inst., quotes a letter from Naples, stating that four generals and a great number of officers of the army had dismissed the service.

Schleswig Holstein.
The Holsteiners seem to weary of lying inactive within their entrenchments. Col. De Tann at the head of two or three battalions, has made several attempts to engage the Danes in petty skirmishes which the Danish Generals as invariably decline, as not likely to lead to any results. It appears, however, that on the 9th instant the whole line of posts was engaged, with alternate success to both parties of the combatants.

The issue of this encounter is not yet known whilst we are writing, but the general impression is, that it will prove as indecisive as the skirmishes of the previous days. Partial ratification of the treaty of peace has been exchanged at Berlin, by which it would appear that seventeen states of Germany have approved of the peace. Hesse Cassel and others which stand out do not seem inclined to assist the Holsteiners with the sword of war. We do not see how the war can be carried on without means; but the courage of the Holsteiners seems to compensate for the want of all other resources.
