

Horror of the Overland Route.
The Ohio *Grain* published a letter from a California immigrant, from which we select the following, as showing the sufferings to which those who take the overland route to the Pacific coast are some times subjected:

Second, as to how I got along, crossing the Desert. At the "Sink of the Humboldt," I started at the head of a little band, composed of myself and seven others, and went ahead for the purpose of procuring provisions for the train. We traveled until about 12 o'clock at night; the company became fatigued and I led with me to stop—which I did. The next morning we started early, and in a short time all the water was gone, except that in my canteen. Huff put peaches in his, and before I was aware of what he intended to do, he threw it out. Ten o'clock came, and one after another began to call for water—but alas! the water was soon consumed. At 12 o'clock, there was one continuous cry of WATER! WATER! WATER! in a tone that would have made the tear trickle down the boldest cheek, or fill the stoutest heart with oppression!

In a few minutes, one fell, and still continued to call for me for water. Soon another—and another—until all had fallen beneath the rays of the scorching sun, except myself. For a moment I gave up all for lost. I listened to the cries of my companions, and resolved to save them or die in the attempt. I resolved to reach the river, (Carson river,) and return with water to my dying companions. I reached the river about three o'clock—refreshed myself and replenished my canteens, and then started back. I was pronounced a dead man by all who saw me. Many told me that I was unable to endure the hardships. I traveled eight miles back—found one after another laying speechless. The first one I found was John Hackerty, of Illinois. He was a dying maniac, and had torn the lips from his face! I gave him some water, but he soon died. The one who fell first, I was unable to reach, my strength having failed. The balance all reached the river about 12 o'clock at night. Had we taken proper care there would have been no suffering.

THE WHEELING BRIDGE CASE—Chancellor Walworth's Report.—The Pittsburg *Gazette* contains a despatch from Washington, signed by E. Stanton, giving the following as the report of Chancellor Walworth to the Supreme Court:

"I have arrived at the conclusion and do accordingly decide and report thus—That the Wheeling Suspension Bridge is an obstruction to the free navigation of the Ohio, by vessels propelled by steam, which are now engaged in the commerce and navigation of that river, and by such vessels as will undoubtedly be engaged in such commerce hereafter; and I further decide and report that the change or alteration which can or should be made in the construction and existing condition of the bridge, to remove the obstruction which now exists to the free navigation of the river by steamboats, is to raise the suspension cables and the flooring of the bridge in such a manner as to give a level roadway at least three hundred feet inside, over a convenient part of the channel, not less than three hundred and twenty-eight feet above the level of zero, on the Wheeling Water Gauge. This elevation is twenty-eight feet above the highest point of the present bridge, and sixty feet above the elevation of the bridge at the western abutment. It will give over eighty feet headway on the usual high floods of the Ohio, and the estimated cost is \$208,000."
