

mons Mr. Lock King moved for leave to bring in a bill to make the franchise with the English and Welsh countries somewhat analogous to the franchise of the Borough. Lord John Russell opposed the motion and was left in a large minority, being 100 for it to 52 against it.

The resignation of the ministry has caused a depression in the cotton market, and there is a disposition to purchase. The sales to day are 4000 bales, at unchanged prices, but closed flat.

It is the general impression that Lord John Russell will continue in office as a leader, and Sir James Graham be appointed Premier, should Lord Stanley go in, trouble is feared.

**France.**  
The most vigorous remonstrances are being made by the government of the President against the entrance of Austria with all her States into the German Confederation.

The French Government have sent large reinforcements to the army of Rome, so as to put the expedition on a war footing.

The first cargo of the productions of France, or of French industry, for the World's Fair, left Paris on Tuesday for Dunkirk, where it will be transhipped for London. It consists of 1200 packages of various kinds.

General Navarez has arrived at Paris, and was received with distinction.

**Italy.**  
It is announced that Garibaldi has made his appearance near Genoa—which is rather surprising, considering that only a day or two since he was in good health on Staten Island. He and Mazzini, with it is said, ample means, are making extensive arrangements for the revolutionizing of Italy in the Spring. All kinds of surmises are thrown out respecting their alleged intentions.

**Poland.**  
Russian troops are overrunning this unhappy country, and much distress exists. The czar has issued his ukase, increasing the number of recruits required of the Jews.

The Berlin Zeitung states that the concentration of large numbers of troops in and about Vienna had given rise to the most distressing rumors.

**Rome.**  
It is said that General Geman has determined to declare a state of siege during the Grand Carnival.

**Turkey.**  
There is a probability of a war between Turkey and Egypt. The Sultan desires the Pacha to reduce his forces; the Pacha, on the contrary, refuses to do this, and, on the other hand, has been augmenting them.

Accounts have been received from Constantinople of the defeat of the Arabs by the Turks near Bagdad.

The Turks had likewise obtained some victories in Kurdistan.

The blockade of Samos had been announced.

**Confirmations and Announcements—Constructive.**

**WASHINGTON, March 10.**

The Senate, to day, confirmed Mr. Tilden, Marshal of New Mexico; also, all the other nominations and Justices of the Peace for this district.

Thomas Bate, King, for Collector of the port of San Francisco, was confirmed to-day.

Robert C. Schenck was nominated, to-day, as Minister to Brazil. The nomination was immediately referred to the Committee, and reported upon favorably.

The nomination of Mr. S. G. Goodrich as Consul at Paris, was under discussion. It will doubtless be confirmed to-morrow.

Mr. Easby nominated for Commissioner of Public Buildings, will be confirmed, notwithstanding the outside opposition.

It appears that George F. Curtis has not been nominated as Commissioner of Patents, nor is that office yet vacant. This mistake is remarkable, as three Senators, last week, stated that the nomination had been made; and upon their authority the announcement was made public.

Senators Houston and Rusk left this city this afternoon.

The Senators have claimed constructive mileage for the extra session. The Secretary of the Treasury refused to pay it, stating that there was no appropriation made. The matter was finally adjusted by drawing upon Messrs. Corcoran and Riggs, who have cashed the drafts.

**Executive Session.**  
Mr. Cass defended himself from an editorial in this morning's Republican relative to his letter to Mr. Kellogg, in relation to the River and Harbor Bill.

Mr. Rhet defended South Carolina from the false and erroneous statements contained in Senator Houston's letter to Gen. Hamilton, as published in yesterday's Union.

This gave rise to an exciting and spicy debate between Messrs. Rhet, Houston and Butler, which was terminated by a joke perpetrated by Mr. Hile.

A communication was received from Messrs. Gale & Saxon, of the National Intelligencer, declining to publish, after this session, the daily debates of the Senate.

The Judiciary Committee reported adversely to the allowance of mileage to California Senators by the Panama route.
