MISCELLANEOUS.

Orleans.
In reply to a personal to himself, Gen. Quitman indulged in a few remarks in which he alluded to the late judicial proceedings to which he was a party, and took up a cursory view of the present position of the country. He declared, emphatically, that he was innocent of any actual participation in the Cuba affair, though he admitted that the success of the expedition would have afforded him pleasure. His only offence, he declared, consisted in the fact that he was made the recipient of the confidence of the Cubans, and invited by them to lead the operating forces.

Among the toasts given were some for the Union, for Pierre Soule, for State Rights, and to the memory of Calhoun.

Niagara Suspension Bridge.—A few days since the suspension bridge, over the Niagara, from Lewistown to Queenstown, was tested in the presence of a large number of persons. Thirteen wagons, laden with stand and stone, passed from each side, meeting in the centre; and at the same time one hundred persons on horseback and on foot passed over. The result was satisfactory to the parties concerned.

Pennsylvania Railroad.—The Philadelphia Bulletin says that \$500,000 to the stock of the Central Railroad, subscribed by the Northern Liberties commissioners, taken in connection with the \$1,500,000 subscribed by the city, makes it certain that the required amount of \$3,000,000 will be speedily obtained, and that the great road will be hastened to its completion.

Pittsburg Bridges.—The Wheeling Times copies the Wellsburg Herald's item in regard to legal proceedings being instituted by the authorities of Wheeling against the Pittsburg Bridges, and adds:— "The writer was not well informed. No such proceedings have been instituted, or will they be, in all human probability. Wheeling relies upon her rights, and takes no measures to revenge wrongs, even where the wrong and outrage is as flagrant and base as in the present case."

Assignment of Land Warrants.—A despatch from Washington says the Secretary of the Interior has given a lengthy decision as to the assignability of warrants under the Bounty Land Law. It is addressed to the Commissioner of the Land Office.

He reiterates his former opinion, that the law, as it stands, prohibited such assignment, and ridicules the Republic's idea that the intentions of members of Congress can be officially noticed and acted upon by the Department.

The French have blockaded the Sandwich Islands in consequence of the refusal of the king to pay \$25,000 as commutation for duties said to have been illegally collected. King Kamohamaha has thrown himself under the protection of the governments of the United States and England.

Three Cent Pieces are now being made at the United States Mint, Philadelphia. They are three parts silver and one part copper, and about the size of a Spanish sixteenth, though somewhat thicker.

Mr. Whitney, the proprietor of the railroad to the Pacific, has gone to Europe to confer with the English Government upon the subject.
