

streets, large quantities of cord wood, we understand, have already been carried away.—What remains has been secured with boats, or removed to some higher portions of the landing. Still further down, and near the foot of Cedar street, the water has begun to invade the basement stories of some dwellings tenanted by Germans, and also has forced off a considerable quantity of saw logs. The channel opposite the city is still filled with floating drift wood, but not in such large quantities as in the early part of the week.

FLOOD IN IOWA.—An extraordinary quantity of rain fell in the neighborhood of Dubuque about the 28th ult., causing a freshet which destroyed a great deal of property. Messrs. Thompson & Douglas were damaged to the amount of \$8,000. The town of Garville, in Dayton county, also suffered severely. The house of Mr. Husematter, in which were his wife and four children, was carried off by the water, and no trace of it can be found. The Tribune makes up an aggregate of \$250,000 worth of property destroyed from a few prominent items at the above mentioned places, together with Sageville and Cascade, and says the whole loss in those localities cannot be less than \$5,000.

Two men were drowned in Turkey river while endeavoring to save property.

LATER.—The Illinois bottoms are all inundated, and Illinois river quite deserted. The bridge across Cahokia creek has been carried away, cutting off all communication with the sick country. But three or four houses in the town are at all tenanted.

The O'Fallen Railroad, leading from Brooklyn to Caseyville, has suffered material damage.—about 300 yards of the road has been swept away, and it is feared the bridges on the road will share the same fate.

The Tempest, down yesterday, reported a rise 13 inches the night previous at Alton. In coming down yesterday morning, she took from the water at the mouth of Wood river, about fifty men, women and children, who had been driven by the flood from their homes.

The towns of Madison, Venice and Brooklyn, opposite the northern limits of the city, and Lincoln town are overflowed. The water is up two or three frame houses floated past the city yesterday, bound, we presume, for the Gulf.

At 10 o'clock last night the water was up to a curb stone at the corner of Locust street and the Levee. By noon to-day the entire Levee will be covered, no doubt, from one extremity to the other. After dark last evening, the water rose more rapidly than during the day.

We learn from the officers of the Buena Vista hat about one thousand sacks of salt stored at the mouth of the Osage, and destined for points on that stream, have been washed away by the flood.

The greatest distress is said to prevail among the inhabitants in the bottoms and low lands along the Missouri. Boats down yesterday report having been detained in rendering assistance, removing families, furniture, stock, &c., from one point to another. The destruction of property will be immense.

The steamer Pride of the West left this city last evening for Grafton, at the mouth of the Illinois, for the purpose of taking on a large quantity of grain threatened with an overflow. At a late hour last evening, a majority of the merchants on Front street had succeeded in getting their goods into the upper stories, or to warehouses in the city, and very few will sustain any damage other than the expense of moving, and the consequent depreciation of trade so long as the high water remains.
