

Gen. Foote withdrew his resolution welcoming Kossuth, it being strongly opposed by Messrs. Hale, Underwood, and Dawson. Mr. Seward stated that he had a resolution, similar in substance to Gen. Foote's, which he would offer on Monday. Hon. Henry Clay is quite ill. Mr. Thrasher, lately convicted at Havana of treason, has been sent to the mines in Spain for 10 years. The steamship America, with news from Liverpool to the 22d, arrived at New York on Saturday. Twenty-three English subjects, who had taken part in the Cuban Expedition, have been pardoned by the Spanish government. The King of Hanover is dead. A revolution has broken out in Morocco, headed by the nephew of the Emperor. Father Mathew was staying in Liverpool but intended going to Ireland in a few days. The Russians have sustained a terrible defeat in Circassia, being completely routed and losing 28 guns. The American steamship Prometheus, while on the coast of Nicaragua, was fired into by the English brig-of-war Express, on account of the Prometheus refusing to pay \$123, claimed by authorities of Grey Town for present and average port dues, which the officer of the ship refused to pay, supposing it an illegal demand. This outrage deserves to be looked to. The President has ordered a competent Naval force to proceed to San Juan, Nicaragua, to protect American vessels from like outrages in future, and inquiries have been addressed to the British government, to ascertain whether the conduct of the Commander of the Express was sanctioned.
