

**The Future of Italy.**  
We find the following remarks upon the future of Italy, in the London Quarterly Review: "Englishmen, if they will, really and earnestly, give a thought to the future of Italy, must learn to pronounce not only without shuddering, but even with some degree of faith and hope, the word 'Republic.' And this is rapidly coming to pass. Hundreds of our most eminent men, who a few years ago would not have named a republic with patience, and who even now would resent, in the strongest manner, any attempt to raise a republican controversy in England, have become convinced, and daily and openly declare in their conversations on the subject, not only that a republic is the only solution possible for Italy, but that the hour is not greatly to be deprecated when all the thrones on the continent will have to bow themselves before the blast of a republican hurricane."

**The State Legislature.**  
The Harrisburg State Journal, says:—"The Legislature, this year, as far as we can judge from appearances, will compare very favorably with that of any previous session. Indeed we observe a decided improvement in the lower House. A finer looking body of men never graced the Halls of the Capitol; and with very few exceptions, they are gentlemen of intelligence and ability, who will legislate for the best interests of the State. The same remark is applicable to the Senate. In this body we have some of the first men in the Commonwealth—men of superior intellect and sterling patriotism of whom their respective parties, and the people of Pennsylvania generally, have reason to be proud. We challenge any legislative body in any State, to produce men superior to John H. Walker, Wm. F. Packard, Henry S. Evans, John C. Kunkel, H. A. Muhlenberg, E. C. Darlington, Benjamin Mathias, and many others in our State Senate. It is the general opinion that in point of intelligence and ability, the present Legislature fully equals, if it does not exceed, any former session."

**EMIGRATION TO CALIFORNIA.**—The emigration from New York to California is again on the increase. It is stated every berth, steerage room, and even stowage, in the Daniel Webster, which is to sail for San Juan de Nicaragua, was disposed of a week ago, at which time Commodore Vanderbilt was forced to stop the sale of tickets; and that nearly all the berths of the vessel which is to sail on the 5th of next month, are likewise engaged. This is the Nicaragua line. The same rush is experienced by the proprietors of the Panama route. The steamship Georgia will leave on the 24th inst., and all her berths likewise are engaged.
