

The Panama Railway.
A correspondent of a New York paper, writing from Panama, says:
I have just been conversing with a gentleman who has recently been engaged as an officer on the Copalco railroad. He informs me the work was commenced eighteen months ago by a corps of American engineers; and now, in spite of the most serious inconveniences, American skill and science have triumphed, and this great work is now virtually completed, having but three miles more to finish—the distance between the two stations, Copalco and Caldera, being fifty miles—the whole length of the road when completed. The most stupendous buildings have been erected as stations, engine houses, &c., which in magnitude and beauty are the wonder of the coast. A mole has been constructed, with a dock to be built upon it, running five hundred feet out into the bay, in six fathoms of water. Locomotives are running daily between the two points, Caldera and Copalco, carrying materials, freight, &c. The probable expense is about \$1,200,000.
