

FROM OUR EXCHANGES.

James Lyons, John R. Chamberlain, and Hunter H. Marshall, whig candidates for electors in Virginia, refuse to serve in consequence of the nomination of Scott.

Hon. George W. Thompson, the distinguished and talented representative from the Wheeling District, in Congress, resigned his seat as a member of the House on yesterday. May his successor prove himself worthy to wear his vacant slipper.

Mr. Webster continues on his farm at Marshfield. His health and strength are rapidly improving. He is visited by many of his friends, and the hospitable manner in which they are treated, is characteristic of the man. Everybody is made "at home" in Marshfield. In the meantime, Mr. Webster is watching the pointings and tendencies of the diplomatic world, and bringing the fishery difficulty to an honorable and amicable adjustment.

Rev. E. G. Wood, in the opening prayer of services at Fairfield, Indiana, after praying for the general government, prayed for the Governor of the State, and thus for the Legislature. "And the Lord have mercy on our legislators: Spare their lives until they may return to their homes, and then put it into the hearts of the people to keep them there, and return men of temperate habits and sentiments who will do some good."

The Boston Bee still keeps the name of Mr. Webster at the head of its columns, as a candidate for the Presidency.

Mr. John Morrison, of Leicester, Mass., mentioned a few days since as having been bitten by a spider, died from the effects of the bite on Wednesday last.

The National Guards, Capt. Garland, of Harrisburg, Pa., intend making an excursion to Baltimore, Washington and Richmond, in September.

The English papers, brought by the Niagara, are extremely dull. The Parliamentary elections are now almost over, and according to the most careful classification, the New House of Commons stands thus: For the Ministry, 325 Opposition, 272 Majority for the Ministry, 53

Mr. R. Sands, the equestrian, met with a fatal accident at Wolcott, N. Y., on Saturday last. Being bantered, he undertook to perform his antipodean feat upon the ceiling in the Court House, when the plastering gave way, and he fell a distance of eighteen feet to the floor, by which his neck was broken, and he died immediately.

Paris, it is calculated, annually consumes strawberries to the amount of five million of francs. Epiny, near St. Denis, sends every day, during the season, 500 crates of asparagus to England. Mendon, last year sent a similar amount of plums every day; and Nonifere and its neighborhood one million francs worth of melons in the course of the season.

KENTUCKY INDIANA AND TENNESSEE.—A letter to the editor of this paper, dated Louisville, Ky., July 31st, 1852 says: "The Whig ranks in this State are divided and broken, while the Democratic party are working, vigorous, firm and true to a man. Kentucky will give from two to three thousand for Pierce and King, Indiana will give from eight to ten thousand for Pierce and King, and Tennessee you can rely on. What I say you may depend upon."

FROM THE PLAINS.—The Platte, Mo., Argus says:—"From information received at Fort Les, north-west, we have the report from the plains of Nebraska to the effect that a large body of Mormon emigrants fell in with a considerable force of Indians, supposed to be Camanches from the west of Texas, at Ash Hollow near the upper crossing on the Platte river, and had a fight.—The Indians, though vastly superior in numbers were the whipped party. Both Mormons and Indians are said to have suffered in killed and wounded. After the Indians had been driven off by the Mormons, Captain Wharton, commanding the post at Fort Kearney, went out where the Indians had been, with a detachment of infantry on foot.

What was said of Him. In order that our readers may have some idea of the estimation in which Gen. Pierce was held as a public man, in 1842, at the close of his services in the U. S. Senate, we give a couple of extracts from some of the Whig journals of that day, when it is to be presumed they gave utterance to sentiments rather more honest and candid than those they now express towards him. Then he was voluntarily retiring to private life; now, he is the democratic nominee for the Presidency.

The New York Journal of Commerce, edited by whigs, said: "In the Senate, to-day, the resignation of Senator Pierce of New Hampshire was read, and the President protem was directed to inform the Governor of New Hampshire of the resignation. Mr. Pierce retires at the early age of thirty seven, from the distinguished position he has so long and honorably held as a member of the House and of the Senate, for the last nine years. He has achieved for himself an honorable name—one that is worthy of his patriotic and chivalrous descent."

The New York Express, a leading Whig journal, and now supporting Scott, said: "Hon. F. Pierce, U. S. Senator from the State of New Hampshire, has resigned his seat in the Senate. Mr. Pierce will hardly have a more acceptable man to succeed him. To his political friends he was partisan enough to be always faithful to the party of which he was a member. He was a faithful member of the Senate, and much more unexceptionable to his opponents than many of his party. In the committee room he was laborious, attentive and just, and there, where a member may be most useful, he has been of great service to the country."

The Lancasterian says: One of our friends in Derry township informs us that an old Whig gentleman in that neighborhood, with his fourteen sons, has signified his intention of voting for Pierce and King.
