The New York Mirror says :- "We have seen a copy of a Call for a National Union Con. vention to be held in this city on the 27th inst. for the purpose of nominating Daniel Webster for the Presidency. This call is signed by George T. Curtis, of Massachusetts ; Meredith P. Gentry, of Tennessee, and other distinguish. ed gentlemen. The objects of the movement are to throw the Presidential election, if possible, into the House ; to refute the falsehood of the politicians, that Mr. Webster is unpopular with the people ; and last, not least, to lay the foundations, deep and broad, and strong, of a great National Union Party, composed of the Compromise, Conservative good men of all par. ties."
