

FOUR DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

Arrival of the Steamship Alps.

Boston, April 14. The Cunard Propeller Alps, with Liverpool dates to the 30th ult., arrived this morning, bringing four days later intelligence. The Liverpool Cotton Market was more buoyant and middling qualities had advanced 1-16d. The sales for the three days amounted to 28,000 bales, about one-half of which was taken on speculation and for export. The quotations are: New Orleans fair, 64d; Middling, 5 11-16ths; Ordinary, 4 5-16ths; Mobile and Atlantic fair, 6d; Middling, 5 9-16ths; Ordinary, 4 5-16ths. The imports during the same time amounted to 23,000 bales. The Alps reports having seen on the 30th, at 6 o'clock in the evening, off Point Lynas, the steamer Pacific, bound from New York for Liverpool. The Royal Mail Steamship Cambria arrived at Liverpool on the 29th. The Liverpool Corn Market shows that operations in Breadstuffs are confined to the actual wants of the trade, without any material change in prices. There is more business doing in Manchester and rather better prices are obtained for yarns. There is no political news of interest by this arrival.

ENGLAND.

A private despatch announces that the English fleet would not leave Malta. This may be relied on, as there is reason to believe that an unpleasant feeling has arisen, owing to the precipitate step taken in reference to the movements of the fleet for the protection of the Sultan of Turkey against the encroachments of Russia. A rumor was very current in London on the evening of the 29th, that the Queen had been prematurely confined. The French fleet finally sailed from Toulon for the Archipelago on the 23d of March. It is said that the Emperor feels sore with regard to the opinion alleged to be entertained by the English Cabinet on his general policy. The coronation of the Emperor and Empress, it is reported, will not take place until some time in August, as the Pope cannot leave Rome before that time.

LATEST ADVICES.

PARIS, March 27.—6 P. M. The Monitor publishes two Imperial Decrees. One appoints Gen. Count Ornan, Governor of the Invalides; the others call upon Gen. Duke Plaisance to succeed him as Grand Chancellor of the Legion of Honor. On the evening of the 26th, the peace officers, accompanied by several agents, closed the doors of the Casino Pagnino, where the Petite Bourse had been accustomed to assemble since 1851. The Peace Deputation of London had arrived in Paris, and been received by the Emperor.

ITALY.

The accounts from Milan are to the 23d of March. The State Government of Lombardy had authorized those who served in Italy under Napoleon, to proceed to Paris to congratulate Napoleon III. Letters from Rome to the 20th, bring the intelligence that the Finance Committee had terminated their sittings on the 18th, and had disposed of the deficit of one million five hundred scudi by retrenchments.

The domiciliary visits and arrests continue with great vigor in Lombardy, Venetia, Tuscany, and throughout the Papal dominions. A bill near San Francisco, called Coral Hill, is composed of an indurated lava, which takes a high polish, and is used as building material.
