

PENNSYLVANIA—A Highly Important Bill.

We have received an official copy of the "Appropriation Bill," as passed by the last State Legislature. It may justly be regarded as one of the most important acts of the Session.

The aggregate amount appropriated is very large. Among the items are the following:

Archives, Publication of do, Festival to Maryland Legislature, Repairs of Public Buildings, Scott Legion, Revenue Commissioners, Franklin Canal Expenses, Colonization Society.

The above are the principal items, although there are of course, many of smaller amount, and less importance.

Canal Board Vindicated.

One of the principal reasons assigned for the policy of selling the Main Line of Pennsylvania Improvements, was the alleged inability of the State authorities to conduct the public works in such manner as to render them productive. This inability was attributed, by some, to fraud, by others to improper political schemes, and by others again, to a want of energy and capacity in the person charged with the superintending of certain portions of the Main Line. It was accordingly urged, that all that was necessary in order to render the works productive, was a change of owners, and the transfer, into the hands of a corporation that would bestow upon them the necessary care and attention.

The report proceeds to make a calculation of the value of the Main Line, as follows: The Columbia Railroad is estimated at three millions and a half, and the directors think they could give four millions and a half for it. The Juniata Division is estimated to be worth, to the Company, one million; the Eastern Division is valued at one million; the Western Division is set down at zero, and the Portage road is considered worth a trifle, as old iron. Upon the whole, the directors say that the Company could not afford to give more than seven millions for the entire line. Upon the whole, we are rather pleased with the report. We shall presume, for the present, that it is perfectly honest—that the Directors mean precisely what they say, and that the report is not intended for the mere purpose of concealing an intended bid of ten millions, nor designed to dissuade other capitalists from making the purchase. Believing, then, as we are bound to do, that the Company will not purchase, and that no other corporation will venture upon so dangerous a speculation, we are glad that the Commonwealth will now be compelled to use proper exertions to make as much money as possible out of an improvement which has thus been summarily condemned.

We have hitherto opposed the sale of the Main Line for reasons already assigned, and we are just as much pleased that the sale is to be defeated for want of bidders, as we would have been to have seen the bill for the sale defeated for want of voters. What shall be done with the work? Simply what every prudent man does with his property, when he cannot dispose of it for what it is worth. Let the Portage Road be completed, and let the State construct a railroad East and West of the mountains, along the entire line of canal from the Susquehanna to the Allegheny. Michigan has two railroads hardly thirty miles apart, terminating at the same point, and it will take no great labor to demonstrate that two lines can be well sustained through the central Pennsylvania. There will be business enough for all. The hard work is completed. The course of the canal will furnish a location

for a track of easy grade, and the whole work can be completed at a small additional expense. The State is already involved to a large extent for public improvements. We propose to go a little farther, and reach those who denounce the "stupid old Commonwealth" that she knows the value of her own resources.—Pittsburg Union.

PENNSYLVANIA SENATE.—One third of the State Senate is elected every year.
