STRUCK BY LIGHTNING .- A heavy storm bassed over the Northern part of this county last Thursday night, during which the house of Mr. John Warner of Chest Township was struck by lightning. The electric fluid entered a window upon the lower story of the house, striking the floor and tearing up the boards; thence passed to a corner of the room splintering the boards and setting fire to the floor under the bed in which Warner and wife were sleeping, both of whom scaped injury. Mr. Warner sprang from his bed immediately, seized a bucket of water and extinguished the fire. His two sons aged about 12 and

14 years respectively, were sleeping upon a bed on the floor, and were considerably stunned, being taken up insensible. For some time their recovery was considered doubtful, and no physician being at hand, they were lifted up and carried to the open air, and gradually resuscitated by pumping cold water upon them .-- One of the boys is a black and blue mark left upon him extending from the shoulder to his foot, but we understand he is now able to be up and about. The other boy was burned across his back, is still unable to move, and remains entirely speechless. His recovery is still doubtful.
