

John S. Donahue, of Philadelphia county, taken before the Committee of Investigation, May 30, 1857.

My name is John S. Donahue. I live in the county of Philadelphia, and am a delegate of the Williamsport Convention now sitting. Mr. William Green told me he got one hundred dollars in the same operation—that is, promising to vote for Hubley. I said that as soon as I received the money I would take it over to the convention, and I did so. I received eighty dollars from Mr. WILLIAM B. RANKIN, of Philadelphia county, at the Eagle Hotel, consisting of three twenty dollar notes of the BANK OF MIDDLEBURY, and one twenty dollar note of the Bank of Harrisburg.

The testimony of Mr. Green, as far as I have any connection with it, is true. Immediately after the time the money was given, Mr. Green said to me, "Now, Donahue, you vote before me, and then you hold up the money and say that you got it for your vote." I said I would; and I never put it into my pocket, but handed it to the President of the convention when I went in.

Sworn and subscribed to before me, May 31st, 1850. JOHN S. DONAHUE, E. CALVERT, J. P.

The Committee appointed to investigate this matter, used the following language:

That they cannot find terms sufficiently strong to condemn the dishonest and infamous corrupt course pursued by the individuals (Rankin and Ovenshire) implicated in the transactions referred to.

After the reading of the report it was adopted, and the following resolution passed unanimously:

Resolved, That we denounce as irreproachable the conduct of those men who attempted, by bribery, to assail the integrity of members of this Convention, and direct the President to return the money to the source from which it came.

This was rather a damper upon W. B. RANKIN, and some time elapsed before he again appeared before the public; and when "little joker" does turn up, it is in the character of the President of a democratic club. Last fall he came all the way from Philadelphia to this place, to teach the Western Democracy the lesson of their duty. An indisposition to insult the cause for which he then contended, alone induced me here to listen to his silly boasts of his triumphs as an orator over the opposition. But in Pittsburgh the feeling against him was still stronger, and there he was not permitted to speak, at a meeting to which he had been invited. He went home, and on last Wednesday sits in judgment upon HENRY D. FOSTER, Shades of the Prophet! and is this a trial by one's Peers?

Now what think our readers of Wm. B. Rankin—the servant of SIMON CAMERON in 1850—the mental deer of his master's bidding—the go-between of rascals—the sewer into which was poured the filth of the buyer and seller, infinitely below either of them in honor or honesty? And yet this man RANKIN has the effrontery to stand before the people to denounce HENRY D. FOSTER, to call him "traitor," and class him among the "enemies of the democracy," and to state his want that "the stream of democracy be kept clear and pure." It is not alone in the language that the sting of this denunciation is. It is not enough that this should be done, but a vile blackguard, a miserable pimp for a bawdy-house, a beastly tool and pander to SIMON CAMERON's dishonesty, and a poor, pitiful ass, should be selected to administer the castigation, and read the very flower of the Pennsylvania Legislature out of the democratic party. But let the Eastern democracy have a care. Westwardly will sustain her Representatives. Like them, she can neither be bought by the attempted bribe of place or position, nor be silenced by the threatenings of authority.
