Immediately after the time the money was given, Mr. Green said to me, "Now, Donahue, you vote before me, and then you hold up the money and say that you got it for your vote." I said I would; and I never put it into my pocket, but handed it to the President of the convention when I went in.

John S. Donahue." Sworn and subscribed to before me, May 31st. 1850. E. CALVERT, J. P.

The Committee appointed to investigate this matter, used the following language.

"That they cannot find terms sufficiently strong to condemn the dishonest and infamously corrupt course pursued by the individuals (Rankin and Ovenshine) implicated in the transactions referred to."

After the reading of the report it was adopted, and the following resolution passed unanimously:

" Resolved, That we denounce as disreputable the conduct of those men who attempted, by bribery, to assail the integrity of members of this Convention, and direct the President to return the money to the source from which it came."

This was rather a damper upon W. B. RANKIN, and some time elapsed before he again appeared before the public; and when "little joker" does turn up, it is in the character of the President of a democratic club. Last fall he came all the way from Philadelphia to this place, to teach the Western Democracy the lesson of their duty.
