CLEAN THE BARK OF FRUIT TREES—The mild dews of this month will answer for this purpose. Apple and pear trees are frequently infested with bark lice of several varieties.—They are found not only on the trunk and large limbs, but upon the twigs nicely glued around the buds, ready to take advantage of the first appearance of the tender leaves.—After the foliage has started, it is difficult to remove them without destroying many of the buds and leaves. Now it can be done with very little danger to the buds. In the case of young trees, it is indispensable to their throb. They should be followed up with brush and strong soap suds, at least twice a year, while there is one to be seen. Fine fruit can only be had by close watching, and continued war upon insects. BOROUGH ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance to Extend the Limits of the Borough of Ebensburg.

WHEREAS, by a decree of the Court of Quarter Sessions of Cambria county, dated the 6th day of March, A. D. 1857, the Borough of Ebensburg became subject to the restrictions and possessed the powers and privileges conferred by the Act of Assembly of 1851:

Be it enacted, by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Ebensburg, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same:

That in pursuance of the provisions and requirements of Section 50. of an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act Relating to Boroughs," approved the third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty one, the boundaries of said Borough, be and the same are hereby extended, according to the following courses and distances, to wit:—Beginning at the south-west corner of Spruce alley, which is the south west corner of the present Borough, thence south thirty eight degrees perches to a post in James Murray's meadow; thence west fifty six perches to the "Pittsburg Turnpike;" thence north forty five degrees east eighteen perches to a post on the edge of said Turnpike; thence west five perches across said Turnpike to James Myers' west line; thence north twenty four degrees west, thirty perches to the Indiana Pike; thence north through Stephen Llop's land and Edward Shoemaker's land one hundred and thirty two perches to a post in Edward Shoemaker's farm thence east through land of Johnston Moore, Philip Noon and others, three hundred and three perches to a post in Thomas M. Jones' land; thence south one hundred and eight perches to High street; thence east along High street fifty three perches to a post, east of Jones and Yanner's Fulling Mill; thence south eighty perches through Thomas M. Jones and John Williams land to a post; thence west two hundred and eighty nine perches to a post, said post being thirty three perches from the south west corner of Spruce alley—the place of beginning.

Section 2.—And the Territory, buildings and improvements embraced within the above mentioned and described boundaries, shall hereafter be deemed and taken and allowed to be a part of said Borough, as fully as if the same had originally been a part of said Borough.
